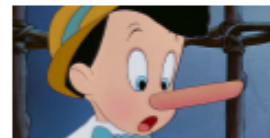

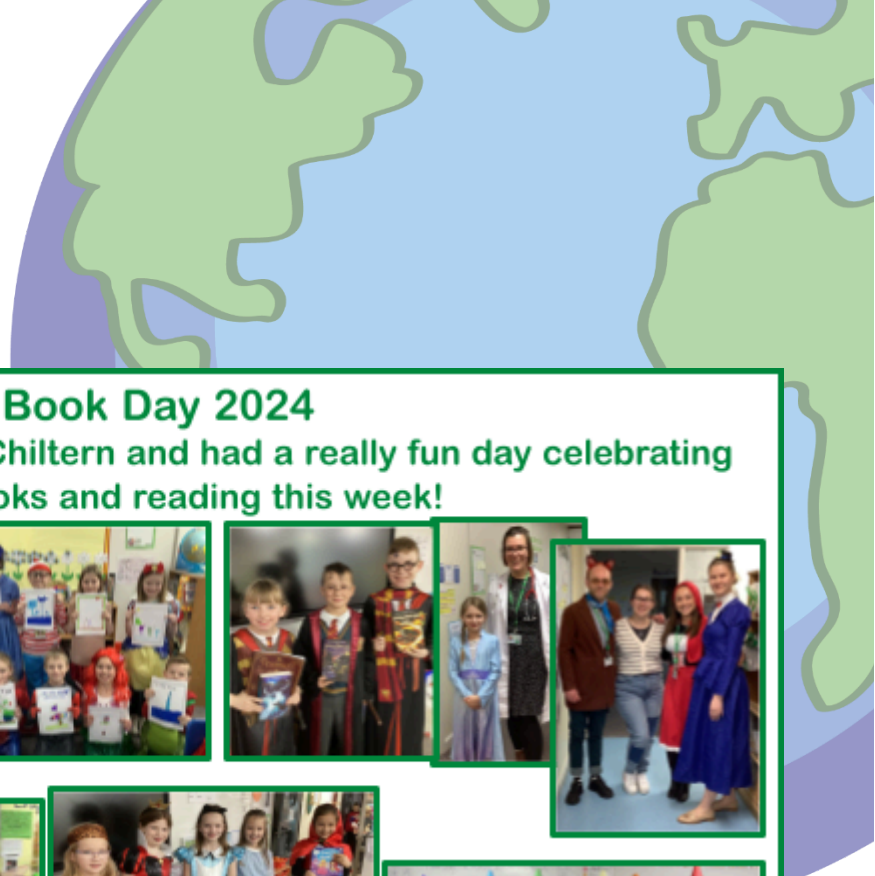

Year 6 enjoyed learning in music this week with a samba workshop from Hull Music Service.

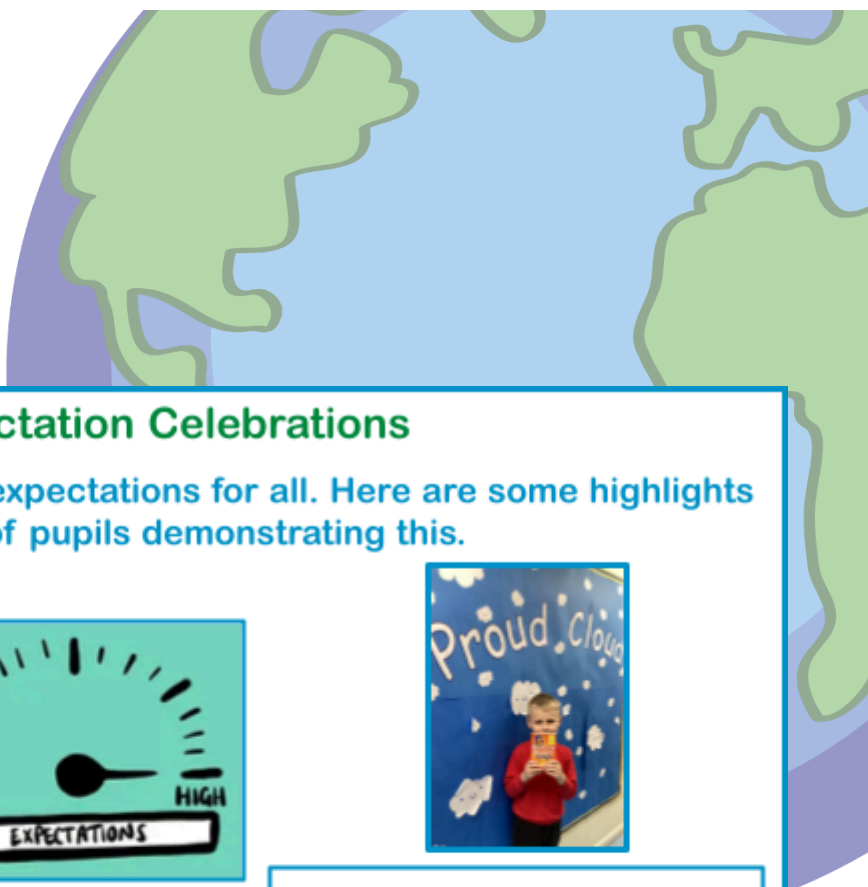


1MP have enjoyed their learning in maths this week using the counters to represent calculations.

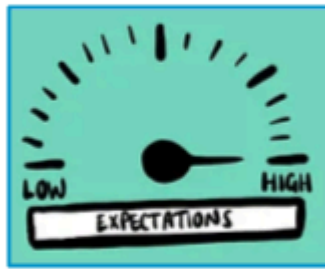


High Expectation Celebrations
